Parking

You may park in **any** of the lots around the church or the Stockade Inn on Sunday mornings.

Need Help?

Large print bulletins and audio receivers are available to assist you. Please ask an usher. Special bulletins for children are also available. Restrooms are located out the front right doorway of the sanctuary.

Child Care on Sunday

Childcare for babies through age four is available from 10am and noon in Kinderwyk, which is located in the building near the church office entry.

Church School

On Communion Sundays (the first Sunday of the month) youth in grades 3-8 remain in the service to participate in Communion while those in grades K-2 gather in the library immediately following the Children's Message for a story. There will be time to check out books and then they will return to room 20 to meet parents after the service.

Other Sunday's all children are welcome to join in our Church School activities by leaving

immediately after the Children's Message. Parents can pick up their children at 11:15am on the 2nd floor at the top of the stairs.

Elders in Worship

Past and current leaders we call 'elders' walk in together at the beginning of worship and sit in the front pew. This is to identify them as servants of the mission of the church and make it easy to see who you might talk to about the life of our congregation.

Communion

Our congregation celebrates the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of the month. All followers of Christ are invited to share this meal.

After Worship

Typically after worship, people stop for a chat and refreshments in Assembly Hall. Visitors are welcomed and are particularly encouraged to visit the Dirck Romeyn Room to the left of the sanctuary for five or ten minutes.

Joining the Congregation

To become a member of the congregation, there is a one-time orientation, a meeting with the governing board, and a reception in worship. If you are interested in the next orientation please fill out a white pew card.

Music Notes

The Anthem, *He Comes to Us*, uses the text by Albert Schweitzer. It is from the concluding paragraph of Schweitzer's path-breaking *The Quest of the Historical Jesus*, originally published in 1906. After surveying over one hundred years of the German scholarly attempt to determine the Jesus "of history," he concluded that each scholar's vision of Jesus was a

reflection of his own presuppositions. The events of Jesus' birth were certainly perplexing to those who experienced them. The child in the manger was an "ineffable mystery" which gradually became clearer over the course of Christ's ministry and his interaction with those around him

Chrismon Tree

Please take a moment to stop in the Dirck Romeyn Room to appreciate the Chrismon Tree. The tree was donated this year by the Assini and Welch families in memory of Russell V. Jones, Anne Shepherd Wemple, Robert V. Shepherd, and Susan Shepherd. The Chrismon (Christ and Monograms) ornaments, which depict the principal teachings and work of Jesus, were first created by the women of the church as a study project, and our first tree was made entirely of these Chrismons. Most of our Chrismons were made for a tree in the Schenectady Museum and later given to Mrs. Harrison Todd to present to her church.
