Easter Offering Schenectady Day Nursery

Our Easter offering this year will support the Schenectady Day Nursery located on Lafayette St. in downtown Schenectady. The nursery was founded in 1902 by a group of church women to address the needs of working mothers. SDN's mission today is "To provide a special place where even the youngest child feels safe and has the opportunity to grow and learn in a caring environment." SDN serves 125 families per year and offers care for infants, toddlers, pre-K, and elementary school children with a variety of programs. They operate about \$1000 short of need for every child and make up the difference with government funding, donations, and fundraisers. Government funding cuts are having a real impact. SDN sliding fee rates run from \$125-\$240 per week for each child, based on the child's age and family income. Additional information will be provided at an Adult Forum on March 24.
