Jazz legend Dave Brubeck, who died on Dec. 5, 2012, wrote quite a bit of religious choral music. All My Hope is part of a larger work To Hope: A Celebration. After having dreamt part of the work he wrote it down and then became a Catholic. The priest of the commissioning organization wanted to inject joy into the Mass and envisioned people swinging a little as they came up for communion. In a 2009 interview on PBS Brubeck described what he considered the essence of Christianity: "love your enemies, do good to those who hate you." I Dream a World was written to a text by Langston Hughes and is from a larger work by the same title.
